# Marshal Papworth students set to change lives through sustainable farming

Fifteen graduates from the 2018 Marshal Papworth MSc & Short course scholarship programme are heading home after completing their studies in the UK. The programme gives the students the ability to take their new found farming skills back to their communities to aid in productive and sustainable farming.

To date, 184 students have graduated from scholarships, working across developing countries to overcome issues including food insecurity, poverty and climate change in a sustainable way. Kenyan Peter Ouma, graduating from his MSc in Sustainable Agriculture and Food Security at the Royal Agricultural University said: "The scholarship has given all of us the ability to realise dreams that we didn't think were ever possible. This will enable us to get the step up we need in order to make a real impact on the communities we work with."

The students graduated from their courses in front of over 80 VIPs at a special "Taste of Africa" drinks

# Food and Farming Day 2018

On the 29th June 2018 Kids Country hosted its sixth Food and Farming Day, an annual interactive learning event held at the East of England Showground and attended by over 5,000 school children and more than 50 schools from across the country.

The event is a celebration of food, farming and the countryside. There were 12 themed zones where 300 exhibitors invited children to take part in hands-on activities that include elements of the Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 curriculum.

On the day, children touch, taste and make various foods, explore a replica African Village, see livestock, watch displays of modern and vintage farm machinery, and learn rural skills such as dry stone walling and hedge laying.

The number of children who have attended Kids Country events has totalled to over 35,000 this year. We had the honour of congratulating





the 35,000th child, Jessica Hawke from Fourfields Primary School, with a certificate and voucher, kindly sponsored by Nottcutts Garden Centre. The certificate was awarded to Jessica by The Lord Lieutenant of Cambridgeshire, Mrs Julie Spence OBE OPM.

Sandra Lauridsen, Education
Manager for Kids Country, said: "It
has been another superb event and
the atmosphere was amazing. It just
goes to show how popular this event is
with not just the children and schools,
but with farmers and agricultural
businesses across the region too.

"They recognise the importance of Food and Farming Day in providing a fun, interactive learning environment where children can develop their understanding of how farmers produce their food and the importance of our precious and beautiful countryside."

After the children first planted their potatoes back in March, the Grow Your Own Potatoes Harvesting day in June gives the children the chance to see the fruits, or in this case the vegetables, of their labour as they finally get the chance to harvest their crops.

As part of the day children get the chance to get their hands dirty as they harvest their own crops, taste different beetroots, learn how to make their own potato salad and discover the history of the potato harvesting process.

# Interview with **YAGRO**Gareth Davies, CEO 8 Co-Founder of Yagro

When technology meets agriculture, exciting advances are born. Yagro is a new, innovative business at the forefront of a modern age agricultural industry.

In this issue of Society News we had the pleasure of interviewing Yagro, who since March of 2016 have been providing commercial intelligence services for farms, and enabling direct connections to suppliers, all through cutting edge technology.

#### Tell us a bit about where your business idea for Yagro stemmed from.

Yagro started as a question: why is there so little transparency or dataled support for farms when it comes to managing the commercial side of their business? The founders got together with different angles on the problem: Dan from the farm, Rich from technology, and myself, Gareth, from industry. We worked with several farms through 2015/16 to develop our initial service, which centred on an online Marketplace for inputs.

## 2) How has Yagro developed so far since its first release in 2016?

Every new business goes through a rollercoaster journey over the first few years, and parts of our industry are uncomfortable with transparency and change.

Thankfully however, we've seen terrific support from the bulk of the farming and supply community. Over 800 farming businesses are now on our online Marketplace, and we are particularly excited about our new data services for farms, which include

agrochemical price benchmarking against fully verified and anonymous data ('Yagro Price Check'). These data services have seen great uptake on farms since the launch in late 2017.

Most importantly, we've put together a great, young team of people who know these supply chains very well and are passionately committed to helping our customers in an open, transparent way.

## 3) What direction do you see the agricultural industry heading in in the near future?

In one word: Transparency! The explosion of information on farm will continue. This information will become better filtered and managed to focus on what's important, rather than today's tidal wave of data. So farmers are going to have access to a level of relevant information which will be a real game changer for the industry.

Emerging technology such as machine learning and artificial intelligence will support our ability to manage this data, though it is important to regard these simply as tools, not solutions in themselves!

I believe we'll see a real performance acceleration in field and at the farm business level, for those who are willing and able to embrace the right emerging technology to get the most competitive edge.





#### 4) Do you see Yagro being a key influencer in the future of agriculture?

We certainly hope to play a role, both as catalyst for a change which we see as fundamentally positive, as well as a valuable service provider in this brave new world. Today, commercial incentives all too often distort the quality and outcome of advice on farm. When I think of the future, I see the key influencer on a farm being an independent voice which will help that business survive and thrive through any conditions.

#### 5) And finally just for fun, do you have an exciting fact about Yagro that you would like to share with our readers?

Well we like a dynamic team here: the average age of the team is in the 30's, we average 2.3 degrees each, and none of us were raised in the same country!



## East of England Agricultural Society backs new soil health initiative

Exciting developments are underway for Soil Health in the UK and the East of England Agricultural Society is delighted to be working and supporting the new initiative launched at Cereals.

The agricultural society has been developing a number of new initiatives which form part of their future plans and this new work with NIAB and others will hope to raise understanding of the health of soils across UK farmland and create knowledge for generations to come.

With wide backing, this new initiative for Soil Health is bringing together scientists, academics, industry farm advisers and farming bodies to take a long-term approach to understanding and improving the health of soils.

The new body is being formed as a direct response to the Government's ambition that 'all England's soils should

be managed sustainably by 2030, supporting profitable and productive farming and underpinning targets for clean water and air...' (Defra 25 year environment plan)

Developed over a series of industry gatherings, the initiative recognises that much is already being done to address the issues of soil health from research to practical field demonstrations. This renewed emphasis on soils will continue to build on the existing knowledge and skills base bringing together information, best practice and develop new approaches. Identifying knowledge gaps and encouraging research into such areas will be an important part of the early work.



Elizabeth Stockdale of NIAB, an academic closely involved in the partnership comments: "From visits to innovative farmers and AHDB Monitor Farms, I have seen lots of research in action to deliver site-specific husbandry that treats soils as a living part of the farming system. This initiative is the opportunity to bring together the best science and practice to improve soil health."

## CEO'S UPDATE

Another very long hot season seems to have flown by and like many of our members we have had to adapt to the intense heat and lack of rain fall on the Showground. The Showground looks in remarkably good shape despite the very heavy usage it has had over the summer, which included the bringing in of over 300 tonnes of sand to allow a number of equine events to take place.

The feedback we have had has been fantastic from schools, VIPs and exhibitors and huge credit has to be given to the Education Committee, internal staff and the army of volunteers that put the day together to make such a memorable event for the children of the region.

The Society is now looking to work with the Combined Authority of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough with a pilot scheme to assess the benefits of the Food and Farming Day and to develop a strategy to work with interested teenagers to encourage them to seriously look into careers in Farming and the Agri Food industry. We are putting together a proposal for the Combined Authority and hope this will be approved within the next 6 months

The Showground is now recovering from a number of weeks of religious festivals with Equifest sandwiched in the middle. This results in a huge work load for the estates team to build up and break down Equifest in record time. Once again Equifest proved to be a huge success and it is certainly a credit to the SGS Team and Equifest Committee for continuing to develop this event year on year.



Festival of Hunting is now established in its new location and we have had fantastic feedback from all the rural press which are fulsome in their praise for the event. We are delighted that Lycetts continue to sponsor the event and have agreed to do so for another two years at least. This allows us to continue to develop the event.

The Championship Dog Show/ Just Dogs Live is always a brilliant weekend on the showground and this year was no exception. Despite concerns of the effect of the extremely hot weather conditions on the dogs, after taking advice, the show continued to the delight of those who had spent many months arranging the show, exhibitors and trade stands alike.

The Trustees have agreed to part-fund a number of the Marshal Papworth Committee members to go to Ghana to carry out a measuring impact survey with the previous Marshal Papworth Students within Ghana. They will be visiting villages and will meet with six former short course students. The trip will be concluded with a Marshal Papworth conference within Ghana to review and measure the impact of the scholarship to the students.

I would expect there will be a full presentation of their findings at the next Society AGM in June next year.

Finally, I would like to thank all our Trustees, Council Members, Members and Volunteers for all their help and support over the last 12 months. We could not do what we do without you and look forward to seeing you on the Showground during the Autumn.


